

Pupil Premium 2020-2021

Schools receive Pupil Premium funding as follows:

- £1345 per primary pupil who is currently eligible for free school schools or who has been eligible in the past 6 years
- £2345 per primary pupil for Looked After children
- £2345 primary pupils who have been registered on the school census as having been adopted from care or leaving care under a special guardianship or residence order dating back to 30th December 2005

This year, we have received funding for 32 children and this equates to £47,040 and we are spending the allocation in the following ways:

- One to one and small group teaching assistant support in order to close any gap in achievement and attainment in English and maths. This includes various intervention programmes £24373.55
- One to one online tuition for maths £6,270
- Further development of in-house support for emotional well-being, behaviour and good mental health. This includes support for individuals (sand play and counselling) with our specifically designated Mental Health/Pastoral Leader, whole school and individual staff training and working towards achieving the silver level of the ATSSA (Attachment & Trauma Sensitive School Award) £12,094
- Additional lunchtime staff for one to one and small group support £3663
- Wider learning opportunities such as the PGL residential and educational visits £399.45
- Resources such as uniform and equipment £240

Rationale:

We believe that children's emotional well-being and good mental health are key to optimum achievement progress and attainment. It is crucial that we provide support to promote positive mental health, emotional resilience and self esteem. Focused work on emotional well being impacts on attitudes and relationships which in turn puts children in the best place to learn and allows them to make sustained progress. We are able to provide timely and bespoke provision which supports individual children so that they are able to learn effectively.

With additional interventions, one to one and small group support, children are well supported to make good progress from their individual starting points and close any gaps in achievement and attainment.

We measure the impact of the Pupil Premium funding through analysis of individual data and tracking. Other self evaluation strategies to measure impact such as observations, work scrutiny and pupil voice is also be used.

This year, despite COVID-19, most of our children for whom we receive Pupil Premium funding have made expected progress from their individual starting points and which had resulted in narrowing gaps in achievement and attainment.

Our Pupil Premium strategy will be reviewed in July 2021.

- £1320 per primary pupil who is currently eligible for free school schools or who has been eligible in the past 6 years
- £2300 per primary pupil for Looked After children
- £2300 primary pupils who have been registered on the school census as having been adopted from care or leaving care under a special guardianship or residence order dating back to 30th December 2005

This academic year, we will receive funding for 40 children and this equates to £54,240 and we are spending the allocation in the following ways:

- One to one and small group teaching assistant support in order to close any gap in achievement and attainment in English and maths. This includes various intervention programmes £25,144
- One to one online tuition for maths £6,270
- Further development of in-house support for emotional well-being, behaviour and good mental health. This includes support for individuals (sand play and counselling) with our specifically designated Mental Health/Pastoral Leader, whole school and individual staff training and working towards achieving the ATSSA (Attachment & Trauma Sensitive School Award) £14,055
- Additional lunchtime staff for one to one and small group support £7,736
- Wider learning opportunities such as Robinwood residential, participation in clubs and extra-curricular activities £689
- Resources such as uniform and equipment £346
